THE GUSTAV MAYER HOUSE

A Living Time Capsule & Rare Survivor

THE GUSTAV MAYER HOUSE is an Italianate Villa Mansion on Staten Island, New York. It was built in 1855 by David Ryers, and has been sold only two times in the last 134 years, making this truly a ONCE-IN-A-LIFETIME opportunity!

Gustav Mayer purchased the home in 1890 at a live auction, while traveling by stagecoach down Richmond Road. Known as the inventor of the Nabisco Sugar Wafer, Gustav also invented bakery molds and assorted tin ornaments.

He moved his family and businesses into the Gustav Mayer House, where his family resided for the next 110 years.

Lovely murals painted by his daughter Paula still adorn the walls and floors of this glorious home which has been architecturally unaltered by time and is as original and authentic as the day it was built.

A RESTORATION in PROGRESS

a restoration in progress, tremendous preliminary work has already been completed.

- The house is structurally sound and currently under extensive restoration.
- Tremendous diligence has been taken throughout the restoration process to preserve the original character, charm and integrity of this prestigious home.
- All materials, techniques and procedures have been employed for long term performance.
 No details were compromised in preserving the aesthetics and original charm.
- All utilities have been updated and have been engineered throughout the house without compromising the aesthetics.
- Two New Roofs have been rebuilt with extensive Copper-Lined Rain Trough Systems on perimeters for long term performance.
- The first floor of the house is 2,250 square feet of completely restored interiors and is where the current owner has resided for the past 35 years.

THE FIRST FLOOR & DOUBLE PARLOR



THE MAIN LIVING AREA on the first floor is 2,250 square feet of interiors that have been restored to museum-like quality. The showpiece of the first floor is the ITALIANATE DOUBLE PARLOR, a 15' x 36' historically accurate period room, with meticulously restored features:

- All windows have been restored using the original wavy glass
- High ceilings, crown moldings, and an ornate arch, center the double parlor
- Two hand chipped marble fireplaces adorn either side of the arch
- Antique pine parquet floor
- Canvassed walls
- All new utilities throughout including radiant heat, and separate A/C zone; all without compromising its visual authenticity
- Hard wired security alarm system



THE DOUBLE PARLOR



The large arched windows of this Double Parlor are actually doors leading to the front covered porch and grounds, also known as the "Living Parlor". Two hand chipped marble fireplaces, and a grand arch center the room above.

A perfect room for large gatherings or special events.

THE FIRST FLOOR

- 1 1/4" x 10" Antique Southern Long Leaf pine plank flooring throughout the home on all 3 floors
- All windows on the first floor have been rebuilt using the original salvaged wavy glass
- High ceilings and crown moldings
- Hand chipped marble fireplaces in bedrooms










Clockwise from top left: 1. Kitchen view. 2. Bedroom with marble fireplace, with access to large dressing room.

THE FRONT PORCH & GROUNDS

POUR PAIRS OF SPECTACULAR fully restored glass panel doors open to a covered veranda overlooking spacious grounds, creating in effect, an outdoor living space, known in its day as "THE LIVING PARLOR."

- The grand splayed staircase is gracious and welcoming and adds to the architectural splendor of the home.
- The front porch provides wonderful and relaxing views of a half acre of picturesque grounds.
- The home is graced with various blooms and trees from a bygone era; including an 80-year old Japanese Quince tree.
- Grounds are all natural and NO pesticides have ever been used on the property.
- The historical grounds were once the site of the Rose and Crown Tavern, built in 1650, demolished in 1854 and was once the headquarters of General William Howe during the Revolution. The Gustav Mayer House was constructed the following year in 1855.





THE SECOND & THIRD FLOOR



Large windows provide an abundance of natural ambient light, traveling throughout the home.




Hand painted murals and abundant natural light from original windows create a magical backdrop



THE 2ND AND 3RD FLOORS have a combined 2,800 square feet. Multiple rooms on the upper floors have been used as backdrops for their authentic and timeless character.


- All new hot and cold domestic plumbing and drainage has been roughed out to various locations for future bathrooms and kitchens.
- New natural gas lines have been provided.
- Electrical sub panel has been installed on the SECOND FLOOR to service future electrical needs.
- A second Weil-McClain boiler has been pre-installed and plumbed in the basement boiler room to supply future heating.



THE CUPOLA

With 360° views including the Raritan Bay, New Jersey, and the Verrazzano Bridge

HE CUPOLA IS the crowning glory of the house and could serve as a sanctuary at any time of day; see far and wide, catch a sunrise or sunset, or just gaze upon the glorious canopy of trees that adorn this half-acre property.

The exterior of the cupola has been fully restored and has been acknowledged by the Staten Island Preservation League.



THE BASEMENT





- VEN THE BASEMENT of the Gustav Mayer House is steeped in rich history.
- Considered the "heartbeat" of the house.
- The basement was originally living quarters for the house staff, complete with kitchen, cooking fireplace, servant's dining room and large marble fireplace.
- Became the site for Gustav Mayer's baking business, credited for inventing the Nabisco Sugar Wafer.
- The basement is currently the owner's woodworking and restoration workshop.


A HOUSE of FASHION


